From the CMO's Desk: Keeping the Doctors We Have – Reducing Administrative Burden



The Toronto Star recently <u>published an article</u> outlining that Canadian physicians spend 18.5 million hours on unnecessary paperwork. One of the reasons is the number of forms we have to complete.

On Feb. 15, during an <u>OMA Pre-Budget Submission Briefing to the Media</u> with Dr. Rose Zacharias, Dr. Jim Wright, Dr. Brian Berger, and myself, OMD focused on ways to decrease the administrative burden by using technology better and engaging the end users in its development.

1. Forms

- The **OMA Forms Committee** and the **Joint Forms Committee with the Ministry of Health** are advocating to reduce the administrative burden of forms. (OMD is a member.)
- OMD reinforces that a digital form is not a digital version of a paper form but needs to be developed differently. We are also advocating for integration into our EMRs.
- There should be no portals that are not fully integrated into our EMRs.

One solution is <u>eForms</u>. More dialogue with Government is required to review and improve the process but it is a good first step. At the moment it is only available to Accuro[®] EMR, Avaros EMR, EMR Advantage, YES EMR, and YMS EMR users, with more vendors set to offer it soon. Contact OMD to <u>request eForms today</u>.

2. Charting/documentation

- OMD and the OMA are working on a funding proposal to examine Artificial Intelligence (AI) technology for scribing. We also have an informative <u>OMD Educates Webinar on Scribes</u> (human and AI).

Tip from a Peer Leader: Using Your EMR to Help Patients Get Proper Care Abroad

This month's tip comes from Dr. John Crosby, OMD Physician Peer Leader and practicing family physician in Cambridge, Ontario. Here, he gives a simple and useful tip for using your EMR to ensure patients receive proper and accurate care while travelling abroad:

"I print out the patient's Cumulative Patient Profile (CPP) and hand it to them if they are travelling. I tell them to store it with their travel insurance paperwork. If they wind up in a foreign ER or doctor's office it is a huge help with allergies, medications, past health history, immunizations, and more."

The burden caused by the reports in your inboxes is staggering.

We have heard your concerns and OMD has spearheaded an HRM Task Force with key decision makers (OH, hospitals, EMR vendors, HIS vendors, OMA, OHA) to decrease this burden.

Since the last few updates, OMD has formed a sub-group comprising members of the HRM Sending Facility Standards Working Group. The purpose of this sub-group is to

develop a list of core reports that should be sent from hospitals to community clinicians via HRM. Not an easy task!

The sub-group first met on Jan. 17 and will meet again on Feb. 23.

View Dispensed Narcotics, COVID-19 Vaccinations and Other Drug Data with the DHDR



Now there's an easier way to ensure appropriate prescribing for patient safety and stay informed about dispensed narcotics using your EMR via Ontario's Digital Health Drug Repository (DHDR). With secure <u>access to drug information</u>, the DHDR gives clinicians information on dispensed drugs, including narcotics and controlled substances, drugs covered under the Ontario Drug Benefit (ODB) Program, publicly funded pharmacy services such as flu shots, and COVID-19 vaccination information.

Direct access to narcotics information from your EMR aligns with the **CPSO Guidelines**

and Standard of Care outlined in the <u>Prescribing Drugs policy</u> (i.e., take reasonable steps to review patients' prescription histories prior to initiating a narcotic or controlled substance prescription), which may include the DHDR in the future for opioid prescribing, and the <u>CPSO Opioid Statement</u>.

Important Reminders

Are You Moving? HRM Needs to Know Where You Are!







Just like the post office, HRM needs to know where to deliver your reports. Moving? Switching Internet providers? Changing your Internet plan? Choosing a new EMR? These scenarios could potentially mean a change to your IT delivery address, disrupting your HRM feed and stopping your reports from hospitals and specialty clinics. HRM only delivers to locations it trusts, so <u>don't forget to notify OMD</u> at <u>support@ontariomd.com</u> when making a change. We need a <u>minimum of 7 business</u> <u>days</u> from the time we receive your <u>complete</u> request with a <u>valid</u> IP address to ensure you don't experience any disruptions to report delivery.
